Naenae College made their debut in the development division at the New Zealand Secondary Schools Rugby League Tournament held during winter tournament week at the beginning of September. We were the only school from the Wellington region, competing against some of the best of

the up and coming schools from Christchurch, Hamilton, New Plymouth and Auckland.

Our pool consisted of Tai Wananga (Hamilton and New Plymouth), Marcellin College (Auckland), and Trident High School (Whakatane). We played Papakura High School (Auckland and tournament host school) in our semis, then Francis Douglas Memorial College (New Plymouth) in our final game.

The tournament itself was an eye-opener for not only the boys but the coaching and managing staff as well. To play at tournament level, especially along the nation's best, required much more than skill and ability alone: integrity, respect, leadership, courage, passion, and resilience were core expectations of the tournament on and off the field. These expectations really did challenge our boys during their game play, testing not only their knowledge of the game but understanding the values the sport teaches. It took some of our boys a little longer to get the hang of not only playing different positions on the field but how to think and work strategically together to execute plays they learned before and during tournament.

Highlights of the week included:

Senior Classes

This year the Year 11FDS102 Food and Nutrition class has enjoyed the programme of practical work as well as the theory. This has been displayed in their improved skills in knife use, baking cakes, sponges and scones, frying and grilling and preparing hot finger food. 

Len has taught Graphics and Hard Materials and has been the Head of this Department now known Design and Visual




Stephen has the ability to work very well with our students and always maintain positive relationships with them. He is




Rajnesh Prasad

Game Design

Ethan Munn comments on his experience combining Design and Digital Technology subjects.

Switching into Design 301 this year was quite daunting. It was my first year stepping into unfamiliar territory having never made a three-board portfolio. When I found out I was required to code a program for one of my Digital Technologies 301 - basically asking me to make a video game, which is what I want to do for a living - it brought up a serious question. Would I have enough time? I suddenly had the idea of merging the two projects together. I'd heard someone had done this in the past when they made a website in the DIT course with some of their designs from the Design course. I needed to create two characters, a logo, a website, an instruction manual and the cover art for a

video game - I would be programming these in another class.

Designing 'Steampunk' characters, one "good guy" and one "bad guy", while also creating original appeal was very challenging. Drawing up characters by hand, scanning and tracing them in Photoshop, then colouring and detailing the majority of them took most of Term 3. Creating a logo which got across both the industrial aspect and the gimmick of the game - merging your character's abilities with gooey G.E.L.s (genetically engineered liquids) to solve puzzles - took the rest of Term 3. When I finished coding and testing for bugs in the first week of the holidays for the game, there were about five different versions, each dealing with 3D movement, cloning the character, and menu interactivity. At this point, I had about four weeks to develop designs for a website, manual and cover art. After many late nights, lack of sleep and many days of staying stuck inside the Design classroom, the folio boards were completed a few days before the due date.




Senior Business & Retail

This year our Senior Business class took part in the Deloitte's "GROW" programme.

Each group of 4-5 students were given \$5 and a Mentor (an Accountant from Deloitte's) to give them financial advice on how to increase their \$5 through various business ventures.

At the end of the 3 week business venture, they should be able to give some of the profit (if there was any), to a Charity that Deloitte's supports called "The Graeme Dingle Foundation". This Foundation provides programmes such as Outdoor Pursuits and a range of other confidence building programmes for school students. Also as part of this programme, the students learn about Financial Literacy. This year most groups made a profit and were able to return some of that to Deloitte's plus the original \$5. English Language Learning

Students have written about the importance of learning English, and their year of English learning.

As one of our students wrote of life in the New Zealand education system, "Education is the key to success. English is the key to education." This year learning English with us have been students from twelve different home countries and

with proficiency in many more languages than that.

Some of their comments:

Why I want to learn English

"When members of my family who have lived in Australia, America and other countries come to our house, they all speak in English but I can't speak it. Whatever I say they mock and then I cry and feel shy."

"When I was young English people spoke to me and when they were speaking I was staring at them the whole time. It was funny but it sucks!"

What I've learned and enjoyed this year

"I like ESOL class because both students and teachers are nice."

"The thing I learned most this year is understanding. To understand what others were saying was difficult for me. Now I understand 70%. When I came to New Zealand I needed a translator wherever I went, but now I go everywhere I want without a translator."

"This class helped me to not be shy, and to share my ideas."

"I have learned a lot. Now I can read and write a little bit."

"I liked when we learned about vocabulary and grammar and when we worked in groups and when we played Kahoots and worked on chromebooks and when we read and when we spoke and when we talked about our situations and when we watched movies and when we wrote."

"My favourite thing was conversation, when we talked together in English."

"I read different books like 'Chinese Cinderella', 'Princess Te Puea' and 'No Good'. I got interesting stories in these books, and new words also."

"The thing that I liked the most was Daily Dash because that will help you every time you write and when you read."

"I used to hate the work but now I feel it is better to do work because I will learn many things and my English will get better."

Our trip to Matiu/Somes Island in November was a highlight for many students from both ELL123 and the reception/transition ESOL class. Mr Elliott was unable to make it but the rest of our staff contingent – teachers Mrs Goguel and Mrs Sellwood, tutors Betsy, Lah, Reuben and Sara, and our volunteer Jenny - accompanied the group of 48 students. We were blessed with perfect weather and with a cheerful friendly group of young people who perfectly illustrated our Te Whanau values and the saying 'unity in diversity'.

Students' thoughts about the trip included: "I loved going somewhere in the ferry. It feels so nice and relaxing looking at the beautiful mountains and the calm water." "I liked all the places that we went on that day but my favourite place was the beach with the rocks at Matiu/Somes Island." "I'll always remember this trip in my mind and my whole life. It is because it was my first time on the train and on the ferry." "When we got there, a man explained everything to us like we're not allowed to touch the penguins' houses where their eggs hatch." "In the museum I saw birds' skeletons and some tools the Maori people used on the island ages ago."

'Unity in diversity' was also on display at our multicultural celebration earlier in the year. This day provides a wonderful opportunity for our students to share their cultures and languages. Some were flagbearers, some performed at the concert, and all contributed to their LAR investigation of their assigned culture.

To all the students and adults who have been part of our learning this year – thank you for all you have done and been, and all you have given us.
