This term heralded the rising of Matariki and the New Year according to Māori tradition. Naenae College celebrated this event over the last 3 weeks. Matariki is based around three principles:

- ·Honouring those we have lost since the last rising of Matariki
- ·Giving thanks for what we have
- ·Looking forward to the promise of a New Year

It was great to have students reflect on these principles and share their responses at LAR times. We completed this celebration at Te Pō Angitū, a night to celebrate Māori student success. It was brilliant to have a good turnout of whānau which was also the case at our open evening and report interviews. It felt like a community again hosting everyone. Thank you for your interest and attendance. Our students have done remarkably well this year to bounce back and reports would have echoed these sentiments.

This term we farewelled respected staff members Sinapi Taeao, Jacqueline D'Ath, Judy Waenga and most recently Mrs Fiona Crawford our Assistant Principal who will take up her new position as Deputy Principal at Queen Margaret College next term. Fiona will be sorely missed for her dedicated work with our Years 9 and 10 students as well as the junior curriculum among many other things. I hope that this message finds you well.

My name is Rome Vailini and it is my privilege to serve as the presiding member, or board chair, on the Naenae College Board of Trustees – alongside my fellow board members. Just a little bit about me and my 'āiga. My wife Megan works for the Parliamentary Commissioner for the Environment, our daughter Avah is in Year 11, our son Rome is in Year 12 at Naenae College, and our youngest son Jet will join them there next year. I work for Open Polytechnic and have been on the board as a parent representative for the last three years – it's been a great experience. I've learnt loads and have gained a great respect and appreciation for all the mahi and the people who contribute to the governance and management of Naenae College.

If you're interested in being part of this important mahi and the board – I encourage you to put yourself forward in the upcoming election in September! Everyone has a perspective and that's the strength of the Naenae College community – its rich diversity of people and cultures.

Survey results and the board's decision

I would like to take this opportunity to provide an update on the results of the survey that went out to you all in May about whether masks should be worn at school, and if unvaccinated staff should be hired. I appreciate that the following information may seem like a lot to digest – but I am motivated by transparency. I would also like to thank those who completed the survey. Essentially, our community, students, staff, and the board are mostly in favour of people making their own choices about wearing masks. Some other schools have introduced a mask wearing mandate this week, and we will regularly review the situation. The vaccination results are a little more complicated because some results are tied.

The following table illustrates the overall results from the surveys.

To provide some further context, the vaccine mandate ended for the education sector on 5 April 2022. This means that all workers and volunteers in early learning services, schools, and kura are no longer required to be vaccinated to work with children or students. This also means that boards are now able to hire unvaccinated staff. As there is legally no vaccination mandate for staff, as the presiding member of the board I have a casting vote to break a tie or any voting deadlock for the board. The Education Regulations contain no directions as to how a casting vote must be exercised, so I have used the generally accepted governance approach, which is to vote in favour of the status quo. Therefore, taking into consideration the results from all the surveys, the board has decided that:

- All employees and staff at Naenae College are NOT required to be vaccinated, unless they are in a role identified as high risk.
- Mask wearing continues to be strongly encouraged for students and staff while indoors but it's not mandatory.

Risk assessment

It's important to note that, as part of the vaccination condition above, to keep the most vulnerable members of our community safe, Naenae College will undertake a risk assessment to determine our level of risk and consider what controls could manage that risk. When we do this risk assessment, we'll think about how things have changed at Naenae College, alongside any new advice about covid from the Ministry of Health. The risk assessment may also identify specific roles where vaccination is needed, for example, staff working in our Te Whare o Te Atawhai Special Needs Unit.

Acknowledgement

This is a delicate situation we are navigating our school and community through – let alone ourselves and our whānau. I would like to take this opportunity to thank my fellow board members, kaimahi and ākonga at Naenae College, and you for your careful consideration and responses throughout this consultation process. On behalf of the board, I hope you and your whānau are staying safe and warm this winter. As we move through the season of Matariki, it is a time for remembrance, peace, and togetherness so I'd like to end this message with a whakataukī.

Kua haehae ngā hihi o Matariki.

The rays of Matariki are spread. People say this whakataukī when Matariki can be seen bright in the night sky. The rays of its stars are thought to carry messages for the people. Matariki is a time to share stories, reflect on the past, and plan for the future. (Explanation from tepapa.govt.nz.)




